I can't say enough about the hard work and dedication put in by Mrs Duncan in the lead-up to the event and on the night itself— she and Miss Adamson (who has been instrumental—pun intended—in developing our music curriculum) are real champions of the arts at HCJS. Our school is a much better place for it.

News, notices & reminders

Tennis Court Parking

Further to our email last week, we would like to reiterate the importance of considerate driving and parking at the tennis courts. Please DO NOT block parked cars in by parking in the centre of the driveway. If the car park is full, please find an alternative place to park. In addition, there is great concern over the behaviour of car drivers as they are entering and leaving the car park. Cars are blocking the pavement so that pedestrians have to walk on the road to get past. Please give way to children and adults using the pavement.

Rule 206 of the Highway Code states: 'Drive carefully and slowly when needing to cross a pavement or cycle track; for example to reach or leave a driveway. Give way to pedestrians and cyclists on the pavement'.

Pedestrian Crossing

Please could we ask you to insist that your children use the pedestrian crossing when crossing Woodways. There are still children crossing between the playground gate and tennis courts resulting in a near miss last week! For the sake of saving a few seconds it is not worth the risk!

PE Kit

With summer well on its way, please ensure that your child has their 'summer' PE kit in school. This consists of shorts, their house t-shirt, socks and trainers. Many pupils do not have the correct kit in school so are wearing tracksuits, leggings and even tights under their shorts! We will aim to inform you over the next few weeks if your child is missing anything. We would also ask that you check your child's PE kit to ensure that they have their own clothing. We have had reports of many missing items so please ensure that your child's kit is clearly named and that they don't have someone else's clothing. Thank you for your support with this.

Children's Book Recommendation

Some of our children wanted to have a go at reviewing a book too, and inspiring their school friends to read. This week we have a recommendation from Theo in 5K.

The Goldfish Boy by Lisa Thompson

Matthew likes sparkling clean surfaces, staying secure in his home and making notes about people around him, and what they are doing. He hates germs and going outside. When next-door's toddler goes missing, Matthew is the main witness of the mystery. He is the key to working out what happened, meanwhile his own secrets begin to unravel. A story about finding friendship when you're lonely and hope when all you sense is fear, this prodigious novel is told from the perspectivs of Matthew, who has Obsessive Compulsive Disorder (OCD). Can he overcome his fears and solve the case before the toddler is gone for ever? I love this book as it is eye-catching and full of cliff-hangers. Once you've started to read it, you will never be able to put it down. The story kept me thinking about what would happen next. It was tense to read as it just kept building up as the mystery unravelled. I would recommend this book to anyone. It's fabulous!
